As of July 1, 2012 the Cat matching gifts program changed. Employees/Retirees are asked to submit matching gift forms electronically via the Caterpillar Foundation website, www.caterpillar.com/foundation.

FROM STARLITES PAST

50 Years Ago, (Spring Starlite)

“The Observing Committee under Chm. Ken Rhoads and Co-Chr. Art Grebner’s leadership has fired our Friday night observing sessions with new life. The ‘College Bowl Quiz’ went over and the meeting on mythology...was both instructive and amusing.”

The ‘College Bowl Quiz’ must have been the predecessor of ‘Astrojeopardy.’ I presume Gene Hodel would not have been in charge back then, so while it may have been instructive, I am sure it was not as amusing as Gene’s ‘Astrojeopardy.’

“Our time Capsule at Lakeview Center contains a 1964 membership list, and a photo of some of the original members of the Astronomy Section after the Observatory was built and before the lecture room was added.”

I wonder if the time capsule is still there? And how easy would it be to get it? Now that the museum is closed, it might be interesting to see if we can get to it and see what else may be there.

25 Years Ago (March Starlite, 1990)

“The latest word on Comet Austin is one of caution. For the last 3 weeks, it has slowed its brightening that led to a predicted magnitude of 0 at perihelion. Current estimates are in the range of 1.5 or even fainter. The board had hoped to put on a public start party if Austin turned out to be a truly spectacular object.”

In reviewing several articles on the internet, Comet Austin did not become a great viewable comet, certainly not like Hale Bopp that allowed for great public viewing. Some compared Austin to another greatly anticipated fizzle, Comet Kohoutek of 1973.

“Dr. Sam Decker has announced his intention to donate the C!\$ Compustar telescope, currently located in the small dome at Jubilee, to the society. The C14 has been a very popular telescope since he allowed us to install it there about 2 years ago.”

It was a sad day recently when we learned that the old electronics on the C14 could not be fixed. I remember in the late 1990’s when I was between prescriptions and had trouble reading the numbers on its display. I had my then young daughter key in the numbers and we slewed the scope to the objects. Great fun.

April's Program features two of Central Illinois' Best Amateur Telescope Makers!

Who builds a telescope when you can buy one so cheap? Well, two of our members have done just that; one having just completed his second scope.

You'll have to travel quite a ways before you'll see three finer home-made telescopes . . . perhaps you will be inspired to build your own.

BOARD MINUTES (November, January---no meeting in December)

November 18, 2014

Board members in attendance were: Scott Swords, Calene Fleming, Dan Son, Mike Frasca, Rich Tennis, Brian Hakes, Gary Bussman, Mike and Linda Hay, Nick Johnson and Tatiana Johnson. Minutes from the Octobers meeting were reviewed and corrected as follows: 500 business cards were mailed instead of 250. Brian Hakes reported the dues renewal form would be published in the Starlite in an effort to save on postage by eliminating the membership dues reminder as a separate mailing. Nick Johnson reported that the observatory was winterized. Terry Beachler identified the source of one of the leaks, but the other continued to be a mystery requiring further investigation. Nick also reported that planning the members' night late in the season seemed to be problematic due to scheduling conflicts. Nick suggested planning it for late April or Early May of 2015. Public observing stats were reported as follows: 7 clear viewing nights, 11 cloudy. A total of 667 visitors attended donating a total of \$294. Calene reported the sky survey images donated by Van Zandt were added to the inventory. Rich reported he would have a slate of candidates ready by Sept. If a committee/position was not active, it was suggested to eliminate it. Mike stated that according to the constitution, the President would establish special and standing committees for the year. Nick inquired about increasing membership dues. After a brief discussion, it was agreed membership dues should remain at \$30. In light of Donovan golf course becoming a park, Mike Hay and Eric had a discussion about PAS posting a sign in the park describing the society and its hours of operations with the permission from the Peoria, Park District. Nick suggesting contacting Peoria Part District to find out what the plans for the park were and whether PAS were considered in the future development of the park. Nick also suggested negotiating with the Peoria Park District allowing PAS to use the building in the park to hold meetings.

January 21, 2015

Board members in attendance were: Scott Swords, Calene Fleming, Dan Son, rich Tennis, Brian Hakes, Gary Bussman, Mike Hay, Nick Johnson, Bill Cole, Jesse Hoover, Terry Beachler, Eric Clifton and Tatiana Johnson. Brian Hakes provided a consolidated report for the months of December and January. He commended that membership dues announcement in the Starlite was working well and dues were coming in as well as donations. He reported about 50% of the member renewed their membership to date. Nick reported that Mike Baietto with the Peoria Park District planned to attend the PS Board meeting to discuss the future plans for the Donovan Golf Course, but was unable to attend and agreed to attend the February meeting. Rich reported he was preparing a rough draft of the slate of candidates to present to the Board. Rich also reported that the January program was cancelled due to inclement weather. It has been rescheduled for April. Brian reported that payment to the museum has been waived due to the cancellation. Jesse reported two new people expressed interest in serving on the Light Control Committee. Gary reported he would prepare the schedule of star parties for the upcoming viewing season, including a few at Northmoor. The leak in the Northmoor dome was discussed. Terry Beachler determined it would require flashing in the dome and a seal on the door to mitigate the leak. Rich spoke with Tim Lester, and the C14 telescope electronics were reported fixed. It was unclear however whether it was powered or not. Eric will check on it and test it.
